Sentences

Simple Sentences

A simple sentence is also called an independent clause.

Simple sentence= subject + verb

Simple sentence always expresses ONE complete thought!

Scott plays tennis in the morning.

Compound Sentences

A compound sentence contains TWO independent clauses (two simple sentences) joined by a COORDINATING CONJUNCTION.

I call the coordinating conjunctions the "FANBOYS".

F FOR
A AND
N NOR
B BUT
O OR
Y SO
S YET

Compound sentence = (subject + verb) + (subject + verb) Complete thought complete thought

Scott was playing tennis, so Mary went to the beach.

Complex Sentences

A complex sentence combines and independent clause (simple sentence) with ONE or MORE dependent clauses (an incomplete thought). A complex sentence ALWAYS has a subordinating conjunction (after, although, since, because, when) or a relative pronoun (that, which, who).

Complex sentence = (subject + verb) + (subject + verb)
Simple sentence | Incomplete thought

I did not see Scott today, because he was playing tennis.
